APPROVAL OF ANNUAL ACCOUNTS AND FINANCIAL STATEMENT (2010-11) OF SPORTS AUTHORITY OF INDIA (SAI)

The Annual Accounts and financial statement (2010-11) of SAI were placed before the Finance Committee in its 58th Meeting held on 10th August 2011 for approval. After detailed discussion, it was decided that after incorporating changes suggested by Financial Advisor (Sports), the Revised Annual Accounts for the FY 2010-11 may be placed before the Finance Committee in its next meeting.

Accordingly, the Annual Accounts for the FY 2010-11 of SAI has been revised after incorporating suggestions given by Financial Advisor (Sports).

1. Sports Authority of India (SAI), a registered society and a fully funded Central autonomous body under Ministry of Youth Affairs & Sports, is required to present its Annual Accounts in the format prescribed for Central Autonomous Bodies. As per schedule prescribed under the Rules, the Annual Accounts are to be finalized on or before 30th June. Thereafter it is to be submitted to DGACR for audit.

4. Expenditure Pattern over 3 years for SAI

5. Liability that has been liquidated in 2010-11 is Rs.4.26 Crores and the outstanding liability in the current year 2010-11 is Rs.4.93 Crores (Non Plan). Liabilities amounting to Rs.1.12 crores have been written off during the year 2010-11.

6. Comments on Income And Expenditure statement

Following are the highlights-

- i) From the year 2008-2009, in compliance with the observations of DGACR and the format for Central Autonomous Bodies, provision for actuarial liabilities for retirement benefits on annual basis have been prepared and incorporated.
- ii) In the current year, income from miscellaneous receipts has gone down to Rs.20.89 crores mainly on account of closer of stadia in Delhi.
- iii) Depreciation has also been reflected in the Income & Expenditure Account and both side of Balance Sheet.
- iv) Up to last year, the grant received for Plan and Plan (NER) were treated as earmarked fund and were shown direct in Balance Sheet instead of Income & Expenditure Account. But now it came to the notice that these should also be treated as income of SAI and accordingly the income & expenditure against Plan and Plan (NER) grants have been shown in the Income & Expenditure Accounts.

7. Comments on Balance Sheet:

- Provision for Pension, Gratuity and Leave Encashment accrued during the year 2010-11 amounting to Rs.34.53 Crores has been made during the Current Year. This is the third time that a provision on actuarial basis for retirement benefits has been made. This is in conformity with the provisions contained in the Performa provided for Central Autonomous Bodies by Ministry of Finance. The total provision from 2008-2009 to 2010-11 is Rs.88.73 Crores. Against the same, Rs. 70.00 crores for Plan provisions has been invested in the shape of FDR against provision for Pension, Gratuity and Leave Encashment. No investment has been made against Non Plan provisions as no funds under Non Plan were available for this purpose.
- Income Tax Department has recovered Rs.68.18 crores as outstanding dues. This has been reflected in the Balance Sheet separately, as desired by DGACR.

- Against the fund received for renovation of Stadia amounting to Rs.280.40 crores, Rs.108.00 crores has already been released to the CPWD.
- On the basis of audit observation, Rs.1.68 crores has been adjusted against maintenance work completed for Afro Asian Games.
- Up to last year, the grant received for Plan and Plan (NER) were treated as earmarked fund and were shown direct in Balance Sheet instead of Income & Expenditure Account. But now it came to the notice that these should also be treated as income of SAI and accordingly the income & expenditure against Plan and Plan (NER) grants have been shown in the Income & Expenditure Accounts.

The approval of the Finance Committee and Governing Body is to be obtained before the Accounts are submitted to DGACR. Finance Committee may kindly concur and recommend approval of Annual Accounts 2010-11 to the Governing Body.

AGENDA ITEM NO. 3

Finalization of Public Works Organization (PWO) under GFR 126 to undertake Maintenance and Repair (Comprehensive services) of the five (05) Delhi Stadium complexes

The five SAI Stadia at Delhi were constructed / renovated by the CPWD in preparation of the Commonwealth Games 2010. The SAI stadia are of international standards and after the games, are being used for training of sports persons for achieving excellence in National and International sports events and for imparting coaching to those desirous of learning sports. The facilities available at the Stadia are being used for other sports events like State/National level competitions.

It is of utmost importance that the SAI stadia are maintained in keeping with the standards to which the stadiums were built / renovated. After the conclusion of the Commonwealth Games 2010, the CPWD was asked to continue maintaining the SAI stadia at Delhi till such time a decision is taken for their future maintenance. As per the GFR 126 (2) construction agencies notified as Public Works Organizations (PWO), can take up works of Government Departments. It is felt that in order to have a healthy competition between two PWOs and both CPWD and National Building Construction Company (NBCC) are PWO within the meaning of GFR 126. In order to get better services for the works of Repair, Maintenance and Operation of the SAI facilities at the five stadia at Delhi, work may be divided between CPWD and NBCC.

It is proposed that the works of the Repair, Maintenance and Operation of the SAI stadia in Delhi be divided as follows:

The NBCC has conveyed its acceptance for undertaking the Repair, Maintenance and Operation of the SAI stadia at Delhi. NBCC has agreed to the departmental charges for SAI of 20% from earlier quoted 23.75% of the actual cost plus the service tax. It has further confirmed that the estimates shall be as per the CPWD norms. Apart from this the NBCC shall also provide comprehensive services of housekeeping services, horticulture maintenance and provide security services to the SAI Stadia. The Security agencies shall be selected by sponsorship through the DGR and hence, it is proposed that the 20% departmental charges would not be payable on security. The Memorandum of Agreement with NBCC is **enclosed as annexure**.

Maintenance and Operation of SAI stadia in Delhi through CPWD (Civil, electrical & Horticulture) at an estimated cost of Rs. 31,36,73,650/- for the year 2011-12

The said item was placed in the 58th Meeting of Finance Committee for concurrence. The time was deferred and decided to place before the Finance Committee in its next meeting.

Accordingly, the agenda item is being placed for the concurrence of the Finance Committee.

The CPWD had submitted an estimate for Rs. 31,36,73,650/- towards civil, electrical and horticulture maintenance of the five SAI Stadia at Delhi. Out of the estimates submitted, the CPWD shall be paid only on basis of the actual expenditure incurred by it. Till 31.8.2011, the CPWD has spent only an amount of Rs. 1.68 crore on the maintenance and operation of the SAI Stadia at Delhi in the current financial year. In case the NBCC is engaged for providing comprehensive maintenance services to the two SAI Stadia at Delhi, as per separate agenda item no.3, then also concurrence may be given for the total amount of Rs. 31,36,73,650/-. The concurred amount will be apportioned and limited to the estimates.

Setting up of staff unit of CPWD for maintenance of SAI Stadia at total annual cost of Rs. 4.75 crores for the year 2011-12

The CPWD has submitted a list of 78 staff/officers for setting up of a dedicated unit for the maintenance of the five SAI Stadia Complexes in Delhi at an annual expenditure of Rs. 4.75 crores. This issue was discussed in the 58th Meeting of the Finance Committee and decision was deferred.

There is already an agenda item for engagement of NBCC, a PWO for providing comprehensive maintenance services at two stadia at Delhi. It is proposed that CPWD would continue to provide maintenance services at three SAI Stadia at Delhi. If a decision is taken to engage NBCC for the SAI Stadia then the number of staff in the dedicated unit of CPWD will have to be reworked / reduced.

It is proposed that 'In Principal' approval may be accorded for setting up of a reworked/reduced dedicated unit of CPWD, a Public Works Organization (PWO) to look after the maintenance works of the three SAI Stadia in Delhi.

SAI may also reduced/rework the number of staff/officers required in the dedicated unit in consultation with the CPWD and Director General, SAI may be authorize to approve the proposal and sent it to the CPWD and the Ministry of Urban Development.

Agenda Item No. 6

Launch of `Come & Play` Scheme in all SAI Centres across the country.

The '**Come & Play Scheme**' was initiated at various SAI Stadium Complexes in Delhi, in phases, in May, 2011. The response to the Scheme has been very encouraging and more than 10,000 sports enthusiasts have been enrolled and are actively participating in the Scheme. The main aim of the Scheme was to impart coaching, primarily to beginners, to encourage participation in sports and for optimum utilization of the facilities available.

The various SAI Centre, i.e., Regional Centres/Sub-Centres/STCs/SAG Centres similarly have good infrastructure in various sports disciplines and there is a scope of better utilization of the same by encouraging the youngsters in the local community to use these facilities in a more purposeful manner. Presently, in these Centres, training is provided to hostellers and to the non-hostellers under the Daily Coaching Scheme/Day Boarding Scheme and the trainees are provided with financial entitlements like sports kit and stipend.

Gaining experience from the '**Come & Play Scheme**' in Delhi where large number of trainees have participated mainly on the strength of the coaching and infrastructure, it is essential that we may replicate this model throughout the country and use our infrastructure for training of young sports persons which will lead to talent scouting.

It has thus been decided to launch the '**Come & Play Scheme**' in various SAI Centres, i.e, Regional Centre/Sub-Centres/Academic Institutions/STC and SAG Centres. The Scheme may be launched from **October 01, 2011** in all Centres across the Country. Details of the Scheme are placed **as annexure**.

Matter is placed before the Finance Committee for concurrence/recommendation for placement to the Governing Body.

Agenda Item No. 7

Construction of a new Swimming Pool at Sports Authority of India, Netaji Subhash Western Centre (NSWC) , Gandhi Nagar proposed by State Government

The Government of Gujarat had decided to take back part of the land approximately 41,000 sq mtr i.e. 10 acre falling under SAI Western Centre, Gandhinagar for setting up convention and exhibition centre within the proposed Mahatama Mandir Project during 2010 to commemorate the memory of the Father of the Nation.

The land identified was the land under possession of SAI Western centre, Gandhinagar wherein infrastructure had been created by Government of India through SAI which caters to the need of sports persons of Gujarat, Rajasthan, Maharashtra, Goa as well as Union Territories of Daman, Diu, Dadra and Nagar Haveli.

The proposal of Government of Gujarat was agreed to with the following conditions:

- i) The exact area to be handed over by SAI should be jointly identified and demarcated by a team.
- ii) The possession of an equal area as above mentioned land may be handed over to SAI. The site suggested by the Government of Gujarat at about 1.1 kms from the present SAI Centre is acceptable.
- iii) Simultaneously, SAI will hand over the possession of the land at the present SAI Centre on 'as is where is' basis along with structures. Government of Gujarat will also concurrently give permission to SAI for felling of trees on exchanged piece of land so that the land could be utilized for future use.
- iv) Government of Gujarat/ its nominated agency will re-construct all the facilities/ services of similar nature that fall in the resumed area. This will involve a Guest House, Filtration Plant of the Swimming Pool, a Sump near the Filtration Plant and temporary toilets adjacent to the existing Multi-purpose Hall. All these facilities should be reconstructed in the balance land available with SAI at the existing SAI Centre. Since the Filtration Plant and Sump are integral part of the swimming pool, the relocation of the Filtration Plant and Sump will require alternation in the Pool also. Government of Gujarat in turn is to rebuild the pool along with Filtration Plant and sump at the same place or a new place within the campus identified by SAI, a little away from the boundary wall.
- v) Government of Gujarat/ its nominated agency is to construct an appropriate compound wall around the SAI Centre since some of the sporting facilities come very close to the boundary, along with resurfacing of the internal roads and replacement of street lights. An adequate space, say 5-6 mtrs, at the corner of Multi-purpose Training Hall, may also be left for passage/ movement of fire tenders. The alignment of nearby roads will have to be fixed accordingly.
- vi) All the services, like sewerage, water supply and drainage, etc. will be restored in the new lay out by Government of Gujarat.

The Mahatma Mandir Project has since been completed and now, Chief Secretary, Government of Gujarat has proposed to construct a new swimming pool at an estimated cost of Rs 10.47 crores for which they are ready to contribute 60% and SAI is to bear 40% of the project cost in view of the following facts:

- i) The filtration system was partly functional
- ii) Severe leakages in Swimming Pool and Diving Pool
- iii) Inbuilt mechanism of filtration of both pools especially the overflow recirculation system was weakly functional.
- iv) The existing swimming complex is old (built in 1981) and the civil structures are damaged while the steel structures are corroded.

Concurrence of Finance Committee is solicited for

Construction of new Swimming Pool on reimbursement basis of 40% expenditure subject to maximum of 4.15 crore.

Agenda Item No. 8

Implementation of the Scheme” COME AND PLAY”

Purpose:The Ministry of Youth Affairs in its endeavor to utilize the upgraded / redeveloped stadium / infrastructure to its optimum constituted a committee under the Chairmanship of Director general, Sports Authority of India, comprising of eminent sports persons and sports journalists. The objective of the committee was to examine various options for legacy planning of stadia so that the same would also act as the tool for not only broad basing sports but also to encourage all strata of the society for mass participation. For this purpose alone, the committee recommended that the fee structure should be at the minimal.

Methodology:The Committee constituted by MYAS met on 7th Feb, 2011 and 25th Feb 2011. In its third meeting held on March 7th, 2011, the Hon’ble Minister of State (I/C) Youth Affairs and Sports desired that the recommendations of the Committee should also include guidelines on the sporting disciplines as well. The disciplines as per facilities available are listed below:

The recommendations of the committee were reviewed by the Hon’ble Minister Youth Affairs and Sports on the 14th April 2011. **The scheme ‘Come and Play’ was announced by the Hon’ble Minister Youth Affairs and Sports on 15th April, 2011.** The scheme was also uploaded on the official website of the Sports Authority of India.

Execution: Through the active association of the Stadia Division and the Administrators the scheme has seen grand success and any challenges faced are being addressed effectively. More than 10,000/- trainees are being benefited from this scheme.

Financial implications: The Basic expenditure being incurred on the scheme is essentially on equipment [consumables] / installations and the services of NIS diploma holders of the passing out batches (assistant to SAI Coaches for imparting training). An approximate expenditure incurred is being detailed below:

1. Consumables / Installations of equipment: Rupees 4,72,265 /-
 2. Honorarium to NIC Diploma Holders : Rupees: 22,38,120/-
- Total Expenditure incurred: 27,10,385/-** [Rupees twenty seven lakh ten thousand three hundred and eighty five only]

Administrative approval of the scheme “Come and Play” and financial approval for the expenditure incurred may please be granted.

3.2 In the above schedule where morning session is not indicated, the same would be started after the Summer Coaching Camp ends on June 30, 2011 as indicated in para 3.3 below.

3.3 Summer Coaching Camps: During summer break period (in schools and colleges), to utilize the stadium optimally, the stadium should be opened for both morning and evening sessions. During **May 21 to June 30, 2011** (to be aligned each year with summer holidays), the morning session will be held from **7am to 10am** in all the above mentioned venues where morning session has not been indicated and would be limited to children under 16 years of age.

3.4 After the above schedules stabilize, during the period for which activity has not been mentioned the venues may be offered to education institutions, schools of excellence and other organizations for sporting activities on higher charges which should be worked out separately.

4.0 Process of entry and registration

4.1 Registration will be done on first come first serve basis.

4.2 Once the particular venue is made open for starting sporting activities , individuals should apply in the prescribed application form for admission to the contact persons mentioned at para 8.0 below. Applications should be entertained starting 10 days before the start of the venue as indicated in para 2.1 above. The application form has been hoisted on the web-site of SAI.

4.3 Efforts should be made to register maximum number of interested persons and the only limiting factor should be physical constraints of capacity.

4.4 Each trainee will be registered for a period of at least 3 months and up to one year on registration fees detailed in para 5.1

5.0 Fee and Facilities

5.1 The following fee as indicated below would be levied. The fee has been kept low to encourage wide usage. SAI should make attempts with transport service providers to provide concession passes to the admitted sportspersons in line with their other customers like student concession by DTC. Also indicated are the basic facilities that could be provided. Minimum inescapable sports equipment like balls, nets, stumps, boxing gloves, shuttlecocks etc. will also be provided to the trainees.
